“You that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price!” (Isaiah 55:1b).

Sounds like quite a sale. Come and shop and leave the wallet and credit cards behind. Really—this one is on us. Want something to eat or drink? The buffet is free today!

The problem with some biblical passages is not that they are hard to understand; it's that they are hard to believe. The message of Isaiah is crystal clear. It offers something for nothing. An offer we “can't refuse”? Is this an offer we can accept? We are pretty sure about one thing: if a deal sounds too good to be true,



it probably is. So the biblical message of getting something free has to be shoved into the safe storage bin of religious symbols, where it can sound good, maybe be made into a hymn or two, and then leave us alone.

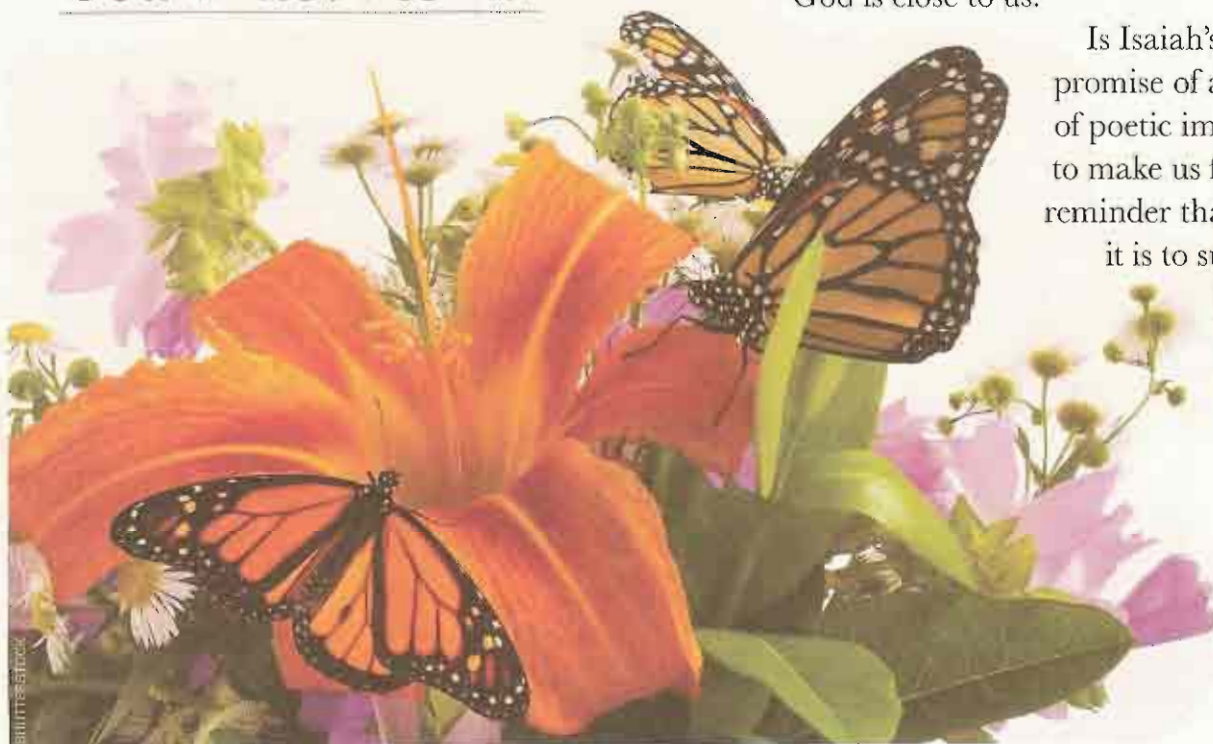
But alone is exactly where Saint Paul's letter to the Romans finds us. Paul asks—rhetorically—what can separate us from the love of Christ? He seems to say that nothing can. He lists anguish, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril, the sword. Do any of these sound close to home? Are we or someone we care about taken up with worry, stress, competition, emptiness, vulnerability, fear, and abuse? These can be overwhelming. They defeat us. They are not normally the qualities of life that remind us God is close to us.

God is close to us.

Is Isaiah's message—the promise of a free lunch—some sort of poetic image, some metaphor to make us feel better? Or is it a reminder that Christ knows what it is to suffer? We *can* embrace his offer even when—especially when—we have nothing to offer in return. And *that's* the deal. We have *nothing* to offer. He offers *life*.

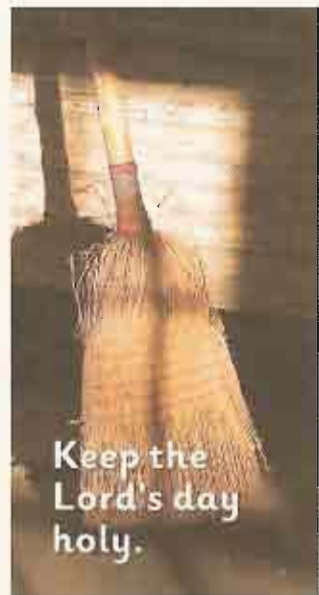

Dear Padre

What does the Church teach about making Sunday a day of rest?



How does the way most Americans spend their Sundays—shopping, doing housework, mowing the yard, catching up at the office—fit with Church teaching on keeping the Lord's day holy and making it a day of rest?

Dear Sunday Gardener,

The *Code of Canon Law* says Catholics are to "abstain from those works and affairs which hinder the worship to be rendered to God, the joy proper to the Lord's day, or the suitable relaxation of mind and body" (1247). This means that

when planning weekend activities, your first obligation is to attend Mass on Saturday evening or Sunday. After that, the spirit of the law is to keep Sunday different from the rest of the week.

The Church tends not to be as legalistic about what constitutes "rest" and "work" as the people of the Bible were. If washing your car or doing yard work relieves the

stress of the work week, feel free to do them on Sunday. Other activities that might be seen as work, like doing laundry, cleaning the house, or shopping for groceries, are acceptable even if they don't exactly bring you joy because they involve caring for your family.

It's good that you look for guidance when your experience doesn't fit totally into a long-held Catholic practice. To find answers, you must go deeper into sources like the Scriptures. In this case, ask yourself, "What is the point this commandment is making?" The answer is that this commandment involves keeping perspective on one's relationship with God and others. Therefore, if you choose activities that bring you joy and a break from your everyday routine or unite you with your family, you'll be following Church teaching on keeping the Lord's day holy.
